During the summer, I spent some time reflecting on what happened in society and what we could do to make it a better world for our students. The Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion initiative has attracted significant attention at schools, universities and everywhere in our country. I admire promoting a place where differences are welcomed and valued, and I heartily support creating an equal opportunity for all human beings. We see some excellent practices in culturally responsive teaching at schools. I believe these initiatives will create a more inclusive environment and a more open-minded generation. In the meantime, I also reflect on the meaning of equality and diversity and question racebased policies. I believe that as human beings, we should always be evaluated based on what we say and do, not the color of our skin. Racial classification could be as close as possible to racial discrimination. Unfortunately, race plays a significant role in many critical educational policies, ranging from anti-standardized testing to race-conscious college admission. Sixty years later, Dr. King's dream of living in a nation where people "will not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character" still holds true.

I am also profoundly horrified and saddened by the mass school shootings this year. Ten years after the Sandy Hook shooting, we were shocked to see the same tragedy again at Robb Elementary School. I am distraught to find out that the past school year (2021-2022) has been the worst period, with 193 incidents of gunfire in K–12 schools. As educators, researchers, teachers, and parents, each of us should think about meaningful actions and do our part to prevent gun violence, which has infected thousands of schools and millions of our students. I don't have an easy answer today and now, but I know collectively we can find the answer because we all care about our students, and they need a safer place to live before they can learn. I hope we will see more discussion about this in future research.

It has been an incredible honor to serve as your President and work with you over the past year. I can't wait to see you all in October to celebrate what we have accomplished and look ahead to what we will achieve in the future!

Lunch and Keynote Speaker: STEM Research Towards Inclusivity and Equity (Darrell Earnest, University of Massachusetts Amherst)

Research in STEM areas has made strides for more inclusive and equitable practices. There continues to be a critical need for research that broadens access and diversifies these areas. This session will consider how intersectional research might support moving towards greater inclusivity and equity. Two projects will be shared that seek to broaden access to these areas

across K-16 education. First, I share efforts to develop cultural sustaining assessment tools in an urban school district. Bringing together computer science education and anthropology, everyday knowledge of first-grade children and their families was gathered through a series of family interviews in order to identify informal computational thinking at play. Second, I consider undergraduates with learning disabilities (LD) and their efforts to manage their time, coordinate efforts in higher education, disability studies, and mathematics education and lead to a framework for providing academic support for LD students.

2021 Best Paper by a Graduate Student Award Dr. LèTanya Lawrence, University of Bridgeport



The Graduate Student Issues Committee (GSIC) would like to congratulate Dr. LèTanya T. E. Lawrence, Assistant Director of Special Education at Cooperative Educational Services in Trumbull, CT. LèTanya's paper *Understanding Induction and K-12 Black Women Educators First* was selected as the 2021 Best Paper by a Graduate Student award. This qualitative case study aimed to explore the individual induction experiences of BWEs in Connecticut urban public schools. Despite the unique challenges BWEs in this sample have endured that have triggered their career movement, BWEs continue to persist past adversity and remain in the field.

Dr. Lawrence built her career as an urban educator, researcher, and advocate for equity, inclusion, and accessibility. Throughout

her educational career, LèTanya has used data-informed practices to support program evaluation and the development of inclusive spaces that allow staff, students, and families to experience a sense of belonging. She began her love for education as a sophomore in high school when she joined the Today's Students Tomorrow's Teacher Program, a "grow your own" teacher development program.

Dr. Lawrence started her teaching career in NYC as a self-contained teacher of students with multiple handicapping conditions. She has also served as an inclusion co-teacher and curriculum designer working closely with her colleagues in different leadership capacities in CT as a special education department head, special education coordinator, supervisor of special education and director of students' services. She has supported the development of special education data and intervention teams. In addition, she has supervised, coached, and developed district-wide teams supporting students in Pk-22.

Throughout her educational journey, Dr. Lawrence has supported school partners across the Tri-state area on equity, special education transition, student discipline, co-teaching, culturally responsive family engagement, student attendance & engagement, special education leadership, and cultural intelligence. LèTanya is a passionate advocate for Intersectionality issues of race, gender, and ability as well as she serves on the Board of Directors for the Epilepsy Foundation of Connecticut.

Dr. Lawrence graduated from Manhattan College with a B.S and M.S. Ed in special education, Sacred Heart University with a CAS in Education Leadership, and received my Doctorate in International Education and Educational Leadership from the University of Bridgeport in 2021. This summer, LèTanya will begin as the new Assistant Director of Special Education at Cooperative Educational Services in Trumbull, CT.



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2022 Lorne H. Woollatt Distinguished Paper Award Announcement

Presenters at the 2022 NERA conference are strongly encouraged to submit an original research paper (no more than 20 pages) in competition for the Lorne H. Woollatt Distinguished Paper Award. It should meet the criteria of being an empirical/inferential or theoretically based study with supporting data and may include case studies. This award is named in honor of Lorne H. Woollatt, a distinguished New York State educator and an active member of NERA. The winner of the award receives a \$500 stipend to present their research paper at an invited session of the Consortium of State and Regional Educational Research Associations (SRERA) at the 2023 American Educational Research Association (AERA) Annual Meeting (to be held in Chicago, IL).

This year's award will be given to the best paper presented by one or more authors at the 2022 NERA conference. Each paper goes through a blind review by the award committee. Each submitted paper is scored on the importance of the topic and need for the study, the quality of the research design, data analysis, results reported, and conclusions and the contribution the research findings make to the knowledge base of the field.

The Lorne H. Woollatt Distinguished Paper Award committee invites participants of the 2022 NERA conference to enter presented papers meeting the research study requirements described above. One copy should be a Blind copy without any author identifying information on the title page, and one copy that includes a title page with each author's names, affiliations, and email addresses. Update from the NERA Mentoring Program (Co-Chairs Bethany Fishbein, Kerry Cotter, & Sarah Ferguson)

The conference-based Mentoring Program has existed since 2012 and serves as a focused, hand-selected match-making process.
